IMPROVING PUBLICATION ETHICS

The editor will actively seek the views of authors, readers, reviewers, the editorial board, and scientific advisory board members about ways of improving the journal. The editor will support initiatives to reduce academic misconduct and to educate researchers about publication ethics. Journal policies will be revised if required, taking into account the new findings in the field of journal editing and publishing and the effects of journal policies on authors' and reviewers' behaviour.

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The editor is responsible for decision which of the articles submitted to the journal should be published. Decisions are driven by quality and the importance of the article to researchers and readers. In making decisions the editor may consult reviewers, the editorial board and the scientific advisory board members. FAIR PLAY The editor evaluates manuscripts for their intellectual content without regard to the race, gender, sexual orientation, religious belief, ethnic origin, citizenship, or political philosophy of the authors. Submissions to the journal authored by the editor, the employees of the publisher or the editorial board and scientific advisory board members will be handled in such way as to ensure unbiased reviews.

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
